Sometimes, that's during an emergency, as when a pipe burst at Animal Care Centers of New York City's Manhattan shelter and we rushed in to help. One of the initiatives I'm especially proud of is our Family Food Pantry. Through this program, we're able to provide steady, reliable pet food, ensuring families don't have to choose between feeding themselves and their beloved pets. The impact of this program is a testament to the power of compassion, and we're honored to be a small part of the incredible work our partner sites are doing to support families.

Our Old Friends New Loves Program also continues to grow, providing senior dogs

with the care and love they need in their golden years. I hope you'll take a moment to read and watch 13-year-old Shelly's heartwarming story. Near death when she came to us, she is now thriving with her new family and physical therapy routine. She's just one of 12 seniors we successfully placed in adoptive or fospice homes in 2024

We also expanded our shelter consulting services, providing training and tools to help prevent dogs from entering shelters and make sure that when they do, their stays are short and enriched. Our internship program is back in full swing post-pandemic, bringing shelter leaders to our upstate New York farm to learn together and take lessons back to their communities. We're advancing the science-based message that all dogs are individuals, and animal policies and practices should reflect this.

None of this would be possible without the incredible support of our partners, donors, and volunteers. You are the reason we can continue our work, creating inclusive communities where both people and their dogs can thrive.


UNDERSTANDING OUR GUIDING PRINCIPLE.

What does it mean that our work is grounded in the understanding that all dogs are individuals? It means that a dog's behavior isn't determined by its breed label or appearance. Modern science shows us that genetics, environment, and experience shape each dog's personality.

The only way to understand a dog is by observing the individual dog in front of you, not by guessing the breed.

Incorrect assumptions and stereotypes about breed labels lead to ineffective laws, discriminatory policies and longer stays in shelters.

Every dog is an individual. Let's focus on who the dog truly is, not what he or she looks like.


Workshops & Retreats. We also reach shelters through workshops at national and regional conferences, on topics ranging from reducing shelter stay times, boosting enrichment, and placing large dogs, to marketing and policy improvement.

In addition, we host professional development retreats on our New York farm, offering handson training and a rejuvenating experience. Each year, we invite shelter leaders and staff to apply for our weeklong onsite internship experience and learning community.

Advocacy. AFF challenges biases, promotes inclusive communities, and works to reform

discriminatory housing policies and breed bans. We do this through outreach and providing best-practice resources to shelters, state and local governments, and dog owners.

Actionable Toolkits. In 2024, we expanded our library of comprehensive digital toolkits on key topics in sheltering, advocacy, and adoptions. We also updated our posters and training tips to help dogs succeed in new homes. All are available at no cost via our website, as stand-alone tools or companions to our trainings.




























After spending a few weeks in the shelter, Shelly's health began to decline. AFF became concerned that the shelter environment was impacting senior Shelly's quality of life. Fortunately, AFF found a wonderful family willing to take Shelly into Fospice care. Once Shelly moved into a home, she started to thrive again. She is currently still living with her Fospice family and now has enough energy to attend physical therapy, helping her enjoy her golden years happier and healthier.




ABOUT
